With the world finally seeing the end of the pandemic, 2022 was a year for renewal, reimagining, and

recharging. The Wheaton

Public Library (WPL) Board of Trustees, staff, and I embraced every opportunity to renew, reimagine, and recharge WPL. Grants were written, programs went hybrid, staff was redeveloped, polices were reviewed, increased arts and culture opportunities were embraced, and partnerships grew. It is with great pride to report that our efforts paid off and library cardholders increased 11%, library attendance increased 32%, and collections grew 6%.

WPL patrons are using the library differently today than just three years ago. Patrons are coming into the library regularly to play bridge, buy a cup of coffee, visit a tutor, meet a friend, pick up a 3D print job, play a video game, use a study room, conduct a Zoom interview, and much more. The world truly did change in 2020 and 2021, and WPL has adapted by recognizing

Launched a new interlibrary loan platform called Find More Illinois




